Debatina

We provide this extra-curricular program offered through the Department of Education's Arts Unit every year at The Junction PS. Even though only a few students are part of the senior debating team, all students have the opportunity to learn about what debating entails and to be part of the debating experience.

We make it very clear to students that debating isn't just about the speakers, it requires listeners too. The audience is a very important part of the process and crucial to the debate itself.

Students learn about all aspects of a debate and what to listen for when they are participating as an audience. Debating teaches students how to listen critically to the argument being made. Students are taught to listen for the words and phrases used to convince, known as Modality, and how to listen for the facts. Students can learn to appreciate and discuss the language that goes into a good speech as well as discuss the topics themselves and their own opinions about those topics.

Teaching students how to debate a topic and not a person is a very important part of the program.

Term 3 will also see the start of **Newcastle Train On Debating** which is a local debating program geared towards those students who would like to have a go in a non-competitive program. Train On supports the building of debating skills and enables our students to debate against students from other schools. This program prepares them for competitive debating offered through the Arts Unit competition each year.

Information from the Front Office Team...

Money collection for excursions & events

The preferred payment option is through the "Make a Payment" tab on the school website, or QR codes on notes. (If you use the online option, please make sure you still return permission notes to school).

The school also accepts cash, (exact amount only), cheque or we have EFTPOS facilities in the office. (Please note that the school EFTPOS facility is only available for school payments and not P&C – such as the Uniform Shop).

Any cash payments to come straight to the office, this includes: -Band fees, Excursion money, Voluntary contributions etc. Any money that is sent to school must be in a sealed envelope/bag with your "Child's name and class" on the front and details of the event you are paying.

There is a "Payments" slot at the front counter in the school office – students are to post payments in this slot.

Absences

Any absence from school must be explained. The Sentral Parent Portal is a great way to advise the school of student absences, or alternatively phone the school, send an email, or write a note. Each day at around 10am, the school sends out an SMS alert to parents of any child who has an unexplained absence for that day. Please refrain from using class apps like Class Dojo to explain absences as the teacher may not be at school or they are teaching and unable to read the Dojo message before 10am.

Extended Leave

If you are going away and leave is over (5) school days, you must complete an "EXTENDED LEAVE FORM" from the office prior to your leave. Leave forms submitted are subject to approval by the Principal.

Late Arrivals / Early Leavers

School hours are from 8.55am to 3pm. The first assembly starts at 8.55am. If children arrive later than 8.55am, they need to present to the office to provide late arrivals information to office staff. A 'Purple Partial Slip' is then taken to the class teacher. Similarly, if children leave early for the day, parents must buzz the intercom at the Union Street gate to admitted into the office. Admin staff will phone the classroom for your child to come up to the office. Please be aware of early departures in recess and lunch breaks as it can be quite difficult to locate your child in the playground.

Medication at School

The office is only able to administer 'prescribed medication' to students. This means medication that has been prescribed by a doctor. This medication must be left in the package provided, clearly labelled with the child's name and dosage. If medication is required, a parent will need to come to the office and complete a Student Health Condition Support for Prescribed Medication form.

Seeking Ethics Teachers at TJPS?

Dear Parents and Carers,

Could you be an ethics teacher at TJPS?

I'm hoping to find a reliable and engaging volunteer to take over one of the Kindy ethics classes at TJPS in 2023. Kindy classes run Thursday afternoon 2-2.30pm.

In addition, we are losing a few ethics teachers for next year and need a number of new, enthusiastic volunteers in order to meet the demand for ethics classes at the school.

Ethics teachers receive full training by Primary Ethics, the not-for-profit organisation approved to design curriculum and training for the ethics program. Training consists of a two-day workshop and short online modules. All lesson materials are provided.

Suitable volunteers have an interest in children's education and development of critical thinking skills. Classes run Wednesday, Thursday or Friday afternoons and teachers are required for up to an hour per week in the class plus 30-60 min of preparation.

In ethics classes, children learn how to think logically, disagree <u>respectfully</u> and support their arguments with evidence, rather than act according to blind habit or peer pressure.

Children discuss topic such as:

- imagining how others feel
- how do we treat living things?
- what is laziness?
- how do we disagree in a respectful way?
- fairness

Primary Ethics classes

Helping children develop skills for life

Primary Ethics' program gives children the opportunity to discuss ethical issues with their peers while developing important thinking, reasoning and discussion skills. Our innovative curriculum was developed by Dr Sue Knight, a specialist in both philosophy and education. Primary Ethics is a not-for-profit organisation approved to provide ethics education in NSW public schools.

Ethics in the infant years

Ethics classes in years k-2 focus on developing core skills such as listening to others, taking turns to speak and giving reasons.

Stories, poems and rhymes prompt children to discuss ethical issues such as hurting someone without meaning to, telling the truth, being kind, forgiving, ownership, fairness and empathy.

Our skills-based topics for this age group include asking and answering questions, disagreeing, changing your mind, working out what is true, giving and evaluating reasons as well as giving examples and counter examples. Logic is also introduced, with topics touching on inductive inference and deductive reasoning.

Ethics in the primary years

In years 3-6, ethics students develop their critical thinking and discussion-based skills.

Stories, contemporary issues and real life scenarios form the basis of discussions on ethical issues such as selfishness, how we should treat living things, promises, greed, friendship, cheating, voting, punishment, homelessness, teasing and fairness in society.

Skills-based topics for this age group include respectful disagreement, inferring or figuring things out, validity, generalising, proving claims, structuring arguments, identifying incorrect conclusions, identifying faulty reasoning, evaluating the strength of evidence and thinking about thinking. Primary aged students are encouraged to develop their community of inquiry skills by asking each other well thought out questions and challenging each other's arguments.

Enrolling your child

Ethics classes run weekly during the school year within the Special Religious Education/Special Education in Ethics (SRE/SEE) timeslot.

Primary Ethics classes are free of charge.

If you'd like your child to attend ethics classes, advise the school office via a note or email. Your child can start as soon as an ethics teacher is available and a minimum of eight students have enrolled in a class.

Getting involved

Ethics classes are taught by specially trained volunteers who are mostly parents or carers. Becoming an ethics coordinator or ethics teacher can be a very rewarding way to be involved in your school community. Volunteer ethics teachers are always needed to ensure that there are adequate classes to meet demand. Experience is not required, comprehensive training and access to lesson materials is provided.




